Passion Sunday

Sunday, 6 April.

Traditionally this Sunday has been known as Passion Sunday. It is the one Sunday where we focus particularly on the suffering of Jesus.

Over recent years this Sunday has shared next week with Palm Sunday so that people don't jump from the Triumphal Entry to Easter Day without engaging with the trials and crucifixion.

This year we have chosen to go back to the old tradition of the church and find ourselves in Gethsemane. To help us do that, the choir will lead us in a couple of anthems held together with two short reflections. It is part of the story we do not often hold onto for any length of time as we rush from table to trials. It is worth pausing within this story to listen to the voices and questions that echo.

Holy Week

Palm Sunday opens the week where we find ourselves deep in the story of love.

On Sunday 13th we begin on the slope into Jerusalem with a donkey and a saviour, and push into the beginning of the week, hearing the notes change and the words shift.

Monday to Friday throughout Holy Week at 11am each morning we gather in the church and find ourselves pausing within the story, looking around, listening, as the shadows grow. We offer 25-30 minutes of words and silence and music that speak into the moment, every

day.

Thursday evening (17th), Maundy Thursday, we gather at the Cross church for communion at 7.30 as well, and on Good Friday evening (18th) we find ourselves back here in New Kilpatrick at 7.30, with the Cross Church.

Stated Annual Meeting

Our Stated Annual Meeting takes place immediately following the service in the church this Sunday (6th April).

The treasurer will explain the finances for last year and the budget for this year. It is also an opportunity to ask any questions you wish about the life of the church.

Easter Day

Sunday, 20 April.

We celebrate. It's all we can do. No preaching, no learning, no teaching, just one big celebration with the loudest Alleluia of the year.

Following breakfast in the hall, we gather in the church at 10.30 and find a million different ways to experience the truth: 'He is Risen!'. An interactive service for every generation to enjoy and be together and eat chocolate (other sweet alternatives are available) and then enjoy some edible liturgy in the shape of lemon drizzle cake afterwards. Why lemon drizzle cake? Answers on a postcard or, better, come along and find out. We're expecting you.
